Global Holidays Around the World In September By Charlotte Chang

The first holiday we'll be covering from September is Chuseok. Chuseok is a Korean holiday that takes place on the 28th of September and ends on the 30th. Chuseok celebrates the bountiful harvest and the hope that next year will be better than the last. People celebrate Chuseok by making platefuls of food such as songpyeon. Songpyeon is a traditional Korean food made up of rice powder and various fillings such as red bean paste, toasted sesame seeds and chestnuts. People also celebrate Chuseok by coming together with their family members to remember their ancestors and to show gratitude for the past, present, and future. For Chuseok women usually wear Hanboks. Each Hanbok consists of two main pieces: the upper garment and the skirt. Hanboks are worn for special occasions like weddings or Lunar New Year—or in this case Chuseok. Men usually wear Hanboks also but instead the men's Hanbok have five pieces including pants, an upper garment, a traditional vest, and an overcoat.

The second holiday we have is the Mid-Autumn Festival. The Mid-Autumn Festival is a Chinese holiday that takes place in the 29th of September. This holiday celebrates family and the moon. People celebrate this holiday by gathering together to light lanterns, appreciating the full moon and eating a ton of food. One of the foods people eat during the Mid-Autumn Festival is mooncakes. Mooncakes are a type of pastry filled with sweet and savory filling. Mooncakes are usually made in a round shape to represent the moon but there are some square mooncakes too. Traditional Chinese mooncakes, especially Cantonese mooncakes, are often baked until the mooncakes look golden brown. Some other foods people eat in the Mid-Autumn Festival are pork, duck, crab, pumpkins, and taro.

Our last holiday in September is Mawlid al Nabi meaning "birthday of the prophet". This Islamic holiday that starts on the 26th and ends on the 27th of September. Mawlid al Nabi is the celebration of the prophet of Muhammad's birthday. Celebrating this holiday is a sign of respect and admiration to Muhammad, who many people believe to be God's messenger. Muslims celebrate this holiday by going to the mosque and spending time with their family. Mawlid al Nabi is also celebrated by going to the Sufi Festival. The Sufi Festival is like a carnival with large street processors. Stories of Muhammad are often narrated by children in the form of poetry during this festival.
